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first-timer contest veteran

IC&C 2016 through the eyes of our newcomers



ach year we take a look back on our experience at IC&C. As the cornerstone of the Harmony year, for many of us, this event has been a fixed spot on our calendars for years. However, there are those in Harmony who walked across the international stage for the first time in Providence. Some were life-long barbershoppers who finally made the trek. Some were brand new to barbershop, diving head first into the deep end of tag singing.

For this year's wrap-up, we decided to reach out to these first-timers to get their take on the contest experience and also provide some advice to members who have yet to make the journey.

Singing with the Queens

Harmony is fortunate to have an amazing group of active Queens, and this year's session proved to be a highlight for Harmony newcomers.

"It gave a hands on approach to the barbershop experience. It was fun, personal and very informative - Being up close to such accomplished vocalists. I sat through the whole morning," said Heather Walton of Shades of Harmony.

Educational Sessions

One of the most surprising things to a first-timer can be the amount of education Harmony offers to attendees.

"I'm new to barbershop but not new to performing. The classes are helpful, informative, and insightful," said Teri Allred of Bella Nova.

Harmony is committed to providing high-quality music education at its events, and this year's sessions didn't disappoint. Back by popular demand, classes were grouped into five tracks — SING, PERFORM, DREAM, GROW, SHARE — each with its own colored ribbon. Students enjoyed showcasing their barbershop harmony IQ by collecting a ribbon from each track, then attaching them to their name badges to demonstrate their barbersmarts.

Singing on-stage

This year's contests were both barn burners. With some incredibly close scores and some of the best singing we've ever heard come across our stage, it was quite a year to come to a Harmony contest for the first time.

"I loved the enthusiasm of everyone and the caliber of talent each quartet brought to IC&C," said Bonita Gray of the Liberty Belles.

Heidi Brown of Bella Nova commented that her favorite part was the Quartet Finals because, "the top ten really brought it."

Brenda Smith of the Seabelles adds, "To watch and hear each chorus and quartet was entertaining and a learning opportunity."

Cathy Muse of Bluegrass Harmony and With A Twist was also mindful to point out the extraordinary judges we had in Providence. "I was so impressed with how supportive and approachable all of the judges were. You could tell they really know their stuff and enjoy what they do!"

Singing... Everywhere

Harmony doesn't just keep the singing to the stage or the event venue. We sing everywhere.

"I especially loved when we sang in restaurants, and people joined in. It was so spontaneous," said Robin Christman of Harmony Magic.

When you talk to most Harmony members, this seems to be a trend. We all enjoy a good competition, but once the nerves of the contest are past, the Saturday night Afterglow always seems to make an impression.

"I love the chance to sing non-competition songs for people and hear other quartets perform songs they love or are working on. I wished we'd had a room where we could do that all night long!" said Kelly Wennik of Intuition Quartet.

The after-contest fun is certainly one of the main things that keeps us all coming back.

Advice to the next class of first-timers

As your chapter gains new members or decides to make the journey to contest, show this next part to those who have never made the trip. Here is some advice directly from a fellow new-comer:

- "Try to relax and go with the flow. By all means have fun and don't let the tension of competition get to you." Robin Christman, Harmony Magic
- "Try to attend the classes. Watch as many choruses and quartets as possible to observe the craft for musicality, performance, and technicalities to make it a success. Network with other choruses. Find out how they fundraise, practice, and what music they like." Joanne McCreery, Liberty Belles
- "Enjoy and soak up every minute." Cathy Muse, Bluegrass Harmony/With A Twist
- "Buy a geek book! They give you so much inside information!" Heidi Brown, Bella Nova
- "Map out and plan out your day beforehand. Otherwise a lot of time is wasted getting from one place to another." Lisa Vassele, Harmony Magic

Bottom Line - Harmony is a family

With all of the singing, contests, and classes, there was one common thread throughout much of our first-timer feedback: Harmony is a giant friendly family.

"The most surprising thing to me was the amount of people who were there. I've tried so many times to get people to join, and I find that a lot of people are just not interested or can't commit to something. I thought it was amazing to have 800 others who share the love of barbershop in the same room as me," said Vincenza Como of Sisters of Sound.

Heidi Brown of Bella Nova echoed that it surprised her, "how friendly everyone was! People aren't usually like that in other places."

The sense of Harmony community can't be denied. As we remember our time in Providence, we are reminded that the work now begins again for next year.

Joy Emmons of Mainly Harmony added, "Everyone is so friendly. But what I came away with is that I am responsible for the success of my group."




It's amazing to meet new people everywhere we go when we go to conventions, but there's something special to share this gift and

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

■ n 1958, approximately 150 women from the Melody Belles (Providence, R.I.), Sea Gals (New Bedford, Mass.), Harmonettes (North Attleboro, Mass.), Harmony Belles (Barrie-Orillia, Ontario), and the Harborettes (Scituate, Mass.), came together in Providence, R.I. to pursue the idea of starting a new organization based on democratic principles and open to all women, regardless of race, creed, or color.

On February 26, 1959, Peggy Rigby, Charlotte Snedon, Mary Avis "Pudge" Hedges, Jeanne Maino, and Mary Perry were elected to lead a newly-formed organization called Harmony, Incorporated.

Harmony, Inc. members are devoted to the ideals in our Harmony Creed, and in the early years, two chapters demonstrated that they believed "all women can belong." The Village Vocal Chords of Harmony Incorporated, started as the little chorus that could, forming in the midst of several large Sweet Adelines chapters, and placed third in their first International competition in 1961, on their way to an unprecedented 19 International chorus championship titles.

In 1963, Ottawa's **Capital Chordettes Inc.** joined Harmony, Incorporated rather than face the prospect of losing member **Lana Clowes**. This two-time international championship chorus continues to give back to their community, and also co-presents the Jerry Dunlop Memorial Award, presented to the Novice Director whose chorus places highest in the chorus contest.

Harmony, Inc. has had many special and theme songs, from our original theme song, A Song of Friendship, to Harmony Grace, Two Nations, and our current theme song, We're Harmony, We're Strong, introduced during our 25th Anniversary, with music by Beth Ramsson, lyrics by **Nancy Foris** and arranged by **Russ Foris**.

One song has created a special place in the hearts of Harmony, Inc. members and not only reflects our past, but also the hopes and dreams of everyone who raises their voice in song.

What a Dream Can Do, with words and music by Christine Hayes and arranged by Steve Delehanty, served as the cornerstone of our 50th Anniversary International Convention, fittingly held where we began — Providence, Rhode Island.

Christine noted, "I had read and heard stories about women who made sacrifices and strove to create something not because it was easy, but because it was right...I wanted another generation of members to reflect on what those founders accomplished and to take up the challenge to continue their courageous dream for another 50 years -- or more!"

Now in our 58th year, Harmony, Incorporated celebrates our "blend with friendship" as we bring together ordinary women making extraordinary music.

editor's note

I don't know if any of you are like me, but I need to sing like I need air. Not just in my car on the way home – I need to sing with a group, and it's not just something that fills my time. If I stay away from my choir or chorus for a long time, I don't quite feel like myself. At best, I get a case of the blues, and at worst my immune system suffers. There are many scientific reasons why this is, but lately I've been drawn to the fact that the act of singing in a group can heal conflict and promote social bonding in a way that nothing else can.

There is a great deal of literature out there on this topic, but I was particularly drawn to an <u>article</u> released by the University of California Berkley in 2015. It discusses how in addition to releasing endorphins, improving breathing quality, and helping slow the effects of dementia, singing together in a group has deep roots in how we survived as a species.

"Being part of a cohesive group has been essential for survival throughout our evolutionary history, but being part of a group also raises challenges... In order to survive, our ancestors needed ways to keep the group together through these conflicts."

The article continues to suggest that tribal song was used to help keep cohesion through difficult times, and that the growth of community singing today shows a return to something that is buried deep within our blood.

In addition to our evolutionary history, did you know that our hearts can literally synch when we sing together? According to a study released by the University of Gothenburg in Sweden, the shared breath and focus of high school students turned a choir into one beating organism. Researchers attached heart monitors to the students, and sat back to watch the show. In the <u>article released by NPR</u> it took almost no time at all for the singers' heart rates to become synchronized. The readout from the pulse monitors start as a jumble of jagged lines, but quickly becomes a series of uniform peaks."

To me, that is beautiful. So often we are a jumble of jagged lines in our own lives. Life can be complicated and messy, and sometimes we miss out on that human connection we so desperately need. When we come together in song, we become those series of uniform peaks beating together and healing not just each other, but also the community around us.

It's hard to ignore the fact that the recent social climate has been primed for division, and perhaps, this is why I feel a need to sing with my Harmony sisters even more. We always talk about how Harmony is a family, and it turns out that notion is more than a feeling – it's science. As a result, now more than ever, our family has the opportunity to be that bright light – both to each other and the rest of the world.
