Now that all the Area convention and contests are over, we've got a few tidbits about this year's contest season:

There were 58 quartets and 45 choruses competing this year

Twenty-three quartets and 24 choruses qualified for International, with 13 Silver Division qualifying choruses (the most Silver Division qualifiers ever)

Farthest traveled competitor at contest was Low Key with one member from On Q chorus from Albuquerque, New Mexico (On Q, Bluegrass Harmony and associate)

Highest percentage of qualifying choruses per Area - Area 3 Harmony, Inc. (6 and 1 Silver Division), followed by Area 1 Harmony, Inc. (4 and 1 Silver Division)

Highest percentage of qualifying quartets per Area - Area 5 Harmony, Inc. (78%)

Chorus with the most members on the Area contest stage - ScotianAires Chorus (47) followed by Sea Belles of Harmony, Inc. and Silk'n Sounds with 45

Chorus with the fewest members on the Area contest stage - (tie ) Codiac Chords, Inc, Surround Sound Chorus, and St. Louis Chordinals with 13

Qualifying chorus with the fewest members on the Area contest stage - Atlanta Harmony Celebration! with 17

Area convention themes:

Area 1 Harmony, Inc. - Colour Our World

Area 2 Harmony, Inc. - Hats off to Harmony

Area 3 Harmony, Inc. - Once Upon a Time

t all began in late 2015 when our local men's barbershop chorus, the North Pennsmen, a chapter of the Barbershop Harmony Society, invited the Liberty Belles Chorus to be guests on their annual 2016 spring show. Instead of paying the Liberty Belles to be on their show as they would any guest ensemble, they provided us with a business opportunity to split the income on all new ticket sales and new ad sales in their show program. The North Pennsmen would manage all details from renting the theatre, hiring lighting and sound crew, props and script to the cost of printing tickets and programs. All we had to do was prepare songs, sell tickets and program ads and perform.

Needless to say, we accepted the invitation and got to work learning two songs which we would sing jointly with the North Pennsmen and preparing four songs for our own portion of the show. After all was said and done, we had so much fun performing on the show, sang to over 800 patrons and raised some substantial income.

The show was such a success that the North Pennsmen invited us back to be on their 2017 spring show. This time, we were going to spend a greater amount of time on stage with them and on our own. The show was called On Broadway and it was the story about singers trying to make it big by auditioning for a part in a hit Broadway show back in the 1980s. As the curtain opened, both the Liberty Belles and the North Pennsmen shared the stage – more than 80 singers blending their voices in four, eight and twelve part harmonies.

Both choruses sang a few songs together, including On Broadway and Take a Chance On Me, then moved on and off stage as each ensemble performed their songs. The story was being narrated from off stage, requiring singers to remain in character at all times. Dotted between chorus songs were nine chapter quartets, adding to the flow and variety with their performances. Both choruses joined together one last time for an amazing finale of All Nations Rise.

The entire production took six months to prepare with several joint rehearsals in addition to our regular weekly rehearsals. The script was created and written by one of the North Pennsmen. The Liberty Belles nearly doubled our revenues over the previous year, helped increase the audience attendance by an additional 130 patrons and together, we provided 100 minutes of variety, energy and great singing - a clear a win-win for both choruses.

# Facebook, Twitter, Instagram: Area 1 choruses CONNECT

In Spring 2017, public relations members of ScotianAires and Sea Belles Choruses reached out to other Area 1 choruses and quartets to gauge interest in a discussion forum during Area 1 AC&C Education classes on ways to improve a chapter's social media use.

Encouraged by the small but enthusiastic interest, **Ann Connolly, Philomena Hughes** and **Tanya Reid** collaborated over the next few months, creating a one-hour workshop for Area 1 AC&C. Using our own social media experience and other online educational resources we narrowed the workshop focus to using Facebook effectively and how a chapter can move into Twitter

and Instagram to connect with younger fans/members/potential members.

We would like to share with you some of our key discussion points.

- On all social media platforms, we reminded the participants that we needed to use a consistent brand and a professional voice.
- Images and videos make the most impact on Facebook but pick your best two or three photos for major impact.
- When you do add text make it short but engaging; speak to your audience like it's a conversation.
- Don't fall into the habit of posting only when you have something to promote or sell, include personal

details about your quartet or chorus and interesting information about a cappella singing.

• And of course...CONNECT...that is the key ingredient in social media - especially in Twitter; re-tweet! Connect with people and groups with similar interests including other choruses and organizations.

> Remember to support your own Area and Harmony, Inc. by sharing important posts and they will do the same for you. Your chorus members can help build connections by inviting their own social circles to like and follow your Facebook page...remind them that everyone in the chorus is part of the PR team!

We touched briefly on ways to further extend your social media outreach with Instagram, showing a more 'behind the scenes' look.

We learned about hashtags and how to properly use them: quality, not quantity. Hashtags will help you get more views and more followers - it's how people will find you on Instagram! Finally, the way to gain followers, is to follow first. Take some time and find lots of relevant accounts to follow. Chances are, they'll follow you back.

The enthusiastic discussion that ensued following the presentation led to the development of an Area 1 Facebook group for the chapter PR leads so that we could discuss strategies and share tips.
