2024 International Convention & Contests

**V** Convention and Contests? Truly nothing, really. Anyone who was at The Galt House in Louisville last November can attest to that!

We never had to leave the complex the whole time if we didn't want to. The Grand Ballroom was the contest venue, and various meeting rooms were used for the classes and the contest-related functions. The vibrant Fourth Street entertainment district was also just a couple blocks away, for those who wanted to venture outside, and it was easy to order a quick meal from DoorDash or a similar service when time was at a premium.

The activities started on Wednesday evening with the Mass Sing and the Opening Celebration. It's always

This location proved to be a popular hangout during the evenings, as the large bar area provided much room for singing and socializing. I did a little of both – I watched a couple rounds of SWTQ, then adjourned to the Conservatory bar for a salad and cocktail while I perused by Barbershop Geek Book. One thing Harmony has added in recent years is an area in the back center of the hall just in front of the AV platform that's blocked off for those of us in mobility scooters and wheelchairs. As a member of that community, I love that we can pull up and stay in our scooters to watch the contests, out of the way of everyone else but still with a clear view of the stage. A huge thank you to whoever's idea this was!

Thanks to Louisville being a conveniently drivable location for the many barbershoppers who live in the Midwest and Southern U.S., we were joined this year by a great assortment of barbershoppers representing all of the North American organizations. It was fun to go down the hall and see many friends from all over barbershop-dom in addition to all of our Harmony friends. The word has really gotten out about how fun our conventions are, and there were many first time attendees there to find out what Harmony is all about!

Thursday morning the activities started again, with a choice of several classes over two sessions for those of us who were looking for some education in addition to watching or participating in the contests. The detailed descriptions of

each class and who was teaching them was available in the wonderful IC&C mobile app that we were all encouraged to download and use during the convention week.

I chose a class taught by Steve Tramack, a very familiar face in the Harmony world. In the class, Is This Barbershop? Steve first explained the fundamental elements that make an arrangement barbershop, ...the quartet semithen showed us videos of finals offer one of several performances and the finest shows in we all discussed whether we barbershop... thought they were barbershop and why.

Other classes offered included topics like How to Go From A to B. Calm Your Nerves, and How To Teach Tags. There was truly something for everyone.

### **QUARTET SEMI-FINALS**

For the contest sessions, there were several rows of reserved seats in the front, followed by many rows of open seating and the before-mentioned scooter parking area. There were always plenty of seats available, but those wanting the best seats know to watch for the pre-registration reserved seating form to open up during the convention week and get those limited number of reserved seats.

With large screens on either side of the stage, though, it was easy to see the contest well no matter where you sat.

As always, the quartet semi-finals offer one of the finest shows in barbershop. This year, we were treated to a mic tester quartet, performances by 24 Harmony quartet contestants, and also this year there was something new - a contest-

> within-a-contest, as three quartets from the Mixed **Barbershop Harmony Association** (MBHA) sang one two-song set each as part of our event. At the end of the day, the Top 10 quartets and an

11th place mic testing quartet were announced. They would sing again in the finals on Saturday night. The winners of the MBHA contest were also announced. Congratulations to Arranged Marriage, aka the Nastos and Lewellens, who were named the new MBHA International **Quartet Champions!** 

# **CHORUS-FINALS**

Friday was Chorus Day. It seemed like just about everyone at the convention sang in at least one chorus that day. There were just a few of us in the audience when the contest started bright

and early at 9:00 a.m. But, as the groups sang they slowly filled the hall, until at the end of the day it looked like a large, glorious, brightly colored quilt.

Each year, the chorus contest concludes with a performance by the International Chorus, made up of members from throughout the Harmony, Inc. organization, and led by the director of the outgoing chorus champions. This year it was directed by Jordan Travis from 2023 champions A Cappella Showcase. I always love watching this performance, knowing that these chorus members learn the song on their own, and come together for just one rehearsal before their performance on Friday afternoon. And again, just like the room in which they're singing, they provide a lovely mix of colors with their varied combination of contestants' costumes and individual outfits.

Following the International Chorus performance, it was time for outgoing champions A Cappella Showcase to wow us with a brilliant performance. If you haven't been to an IC&C to hear them sing live, you owe it to yourselves to do this. They are a wonderfully musical, highly entertaining chorus.



# **QUARTET FINALS**

I went from there straight to the Quartet Finals. This event is always an amazingly exciting presentation of the best talent in Harmony. For these ten groups, it's the culmination of their many months of hard work, and it's apparent in each of the excellent performances. If someone asked me what event most draws me to these

conventions, I'd say it's the quartet finals. There's just something about the buzz in the room, the feeling of excitement and anticipation, and the brilliant performances, that makes this event unlike any other during an IC&C.

Each performance built on the one before it, and we were left in breathless anticipation of the results as the under-25 Minor Chords youth chorus cooled the mic for us, followed by the amazing swan song performance by the outgoing champions, Fierce. The swan song was especially notable in that Fierce was joined by a chorus made up of about 30 of their friends and family members for a final song before they received their permanent crowns.

As a little background on the crowns, when the members of a quartet win the quartet contest and are awarded the title of Harmony Queens, they each receive a traveling crown to wear until the next convention. These crowns are passed from quartet to quartet, year after year. At the end of their reigning year, they're presented with their permanent crowns, which have been designed and made specifically for them.

There's a crowning ceremony each year just before the quartet contest results are announced, where the queens relinquish the traveling crowns and are given

their permanent crowns, placed on their heads by their chosen members of their friends and family. I can remember being a part of this when my daughter Maggie's quartet received their permanent crowns in 2014, on this same stage at The Galt House. We were the first to get to see the crowns, and had a moment to ooh and aah over them backstage before carrying them out on stage behind our backs to start the ceremony. That's one of my most cherished moments as a member of Harmony and as the mom of a Harmony Queen.

Fierce's crowns were beautiful, stunning really, and perfect for them. It's always a highlight to see the crowns placed on their heads then watch them look at each other to see what they look like. Another

fun moment takes place a little later when they're led to a mirror and get to see their own crown on their own head for the first time.

After the crowning ceremony, Fierce treated us to one more song, then it was time to hear the quartet contest results! A hush fell over the room as we collectively held our breath while the quartets sat in eager anticipation. The countdown began as first the special awards, then the medalists, were announced. 5 ... 4 ... 3 ... 2 ... and the winner, with a score of 80.4, is ... Roulette! Outstanding! These singers have given so much to the organization, and it was such a pleasure to see all the love given back to them when they were announced as the 2024 Harmony Queens! Congratulations Morgan, Jess,

Katie, and Lynn - a well-deserved championship! Wear those crowns proudly!

# **CELEBRATIONS**

At the conclusion of the contest is another tradition that I always look forward to eagerly – the Medalist Fanfare, where each of the medalist quartets, followed by a past Harmony Queen quartet waving pompons, process down the hallway outside the ballroom, as we line up on each side to cheer them on. Following this, they each take the stage in the Exhibit Hall outside the ballroom for a few words of thanks and a song. The event concludes with all of the past Harmony Queens in attendance surrounding the new Queens and serenading them with their signature song. What a great day, what a great event!

The evening wrapped up with the Showcase of Champions, where the medalist quartets and choruses, plus the MBHA champion quartet, perform. It's always a terrific celebration, a chance for us to see them doing a variety of contest numbers and other show numbers. At the end of the evening International President Gaye LaCasce declared the convention officially concluded. After stopping to listen to a new quartet perform in the back of the ballroom, we all headed to The Conservatory and a variety of hospitality rooms to celebrate.

It's always sad when it's over for another year, but it won't be too long now before we gather in Hershey, Pennsylvania for IC&C 2025 Until then ...

Thank you Lynn, Jess and Katie for asking me to sing with you, for standing by me during my vocal injury and for providing me with some of the most beautiful musical and emotional moments I have ever had in this hobby! My ladies, my sisters in song, I love you!

# Vocal Injury

I share this part of my journey to help and support all those who have had to navigate through the demands of using one's voice as your passion and vocation.

Due to teaching through two masks with no amplification during the pandemic for the better part of 18 months, I had a rupture of the blood vessels on my right vocal cord and a small nodule on my left vocal cord. Two weeks after Roulette had competed in our first IC&C in 2022 with a 4th place finish, I was put on six weeks of vocal rest, no talking, singing...ZIP! I went back to work after the holidays and once again I was put on another six weeks of vocal rest.

In the spring of 2023, I underwent a laser procedure to cauterize the blood vessels that had ruptured. Were there risks? Yes! I had to be completely awake for the procedure and listen to instructions like, "Please stay absolutely still because if you move, you might not sing ever again! Also, you might smell smoke or a burning smell, please don't stress, it's just the laser..."

I'm pretty sure I had an out of body experience, where I forced my mind to go blank and become numb so that I wouldn't move. The things we do for our passion and profession! Dr. Kost, an ENT specialist of voice was fabulous, and the procedure was a success. (Duh! I'm writing in *THE KEY-NOTE*!)

After the procedure, I did many weeks of vocal therapy through the McGill University Health Center. I am a changed singer now and will always put my vocal health first.

Knowing this procedure was the only way for me to save my voice and continue singing long term, Roulette asked a very special someone — Tessa Walker — to sub for me at Area 3 contest in May of 2023. She said, "Yes," and brought all her amazing musical artistry and infectious personality to this quartet. Without her, Roulette would not have been able to compete at IC&C in 2023.

am still pinching myself that this happened, and that I am here again, writing my fourth "Queen Bio!" It is an honor to join the ranks of four-time Queen, Betty Gunterman!

I've been in HI for almost 40 years, and when I think of barbershop, I think of FAMILY. Joining HI in 1988 at age 12 was something that I didn't know would forever affect the trajectory of my life. My dad, my mom, my sister...we all sang 4-part a cappella in the car as far back as I can remember, and we eventually became a family quartet, singing on shows and afterglows for decades.

Dad always cheered us on in all of our HI quartets and in Northern Blend Chorus, and his, "YEAH!" at the end of our performances was always present. I am grateful for the gift of music that our parents bestowed upon us! My dad was there to see me win three of my crowns, and although he wasn't here to cheer for me in the crowd this time, he was most certainly here with me in spirit!

I am also grateful for the love and support of my husband of almost 29 years, who is not a barbershopper, but certainly knows and respects the commitment I have to our organization, my chorus, and my quartets. I won with **For Heaven's Sake** four months after we got married, so he's been through it all with me! He is a saint, and I adore my Ricky! My boys grew up on barbershop and all things music (I was their music teacher) and are both impacted by my barbershop world in positive ways! Love you, Gavin and Zach!

I was involved in music in high school, but was also a jock, and planned to major in Physical Education. An ankle injury at summer basketball camp leading to my senior year kept me out of soccer in the fall, so I decided to try out for the musical, *Jesus Christ Superstar*- and I fell right in love with musical theatre. # Meet Roulette Bass

# Lynn Blakeney

Grateful and blessed...these are the two words that best describe my life and the impact that Harmony, Inc. has had on it.

I'm married to the love of my life,
James Blakeney and we live in Evans Mills, NY.
I have a son, Josh, who lives in Bloomington, IL, a
bonus daughter, Steph, who lives with her husband
in Vicksburg, MS and a bonus son William, who lives
outside of Pensacola, FL. We also have a cat named
Buzz who currently resides with Grandma, and Moya
the trucker kitty who travels with Jim.

Outside of barbershop? Well, I barbershop! I coach both in person and online and usually have some chorus visual idea running around in my brain. I also do the paperwork for my husband's trucking company.

# How it began

I am the only child of Marcia and Roger Trick. I grew up in tiny Van Hornesville, NY, where I was a massive tomboy riding my horses and showing cattle. I went to a little school with fewer than 300 students, K-12. My mom was my homeroom teacher 7-12, English teacher, cheerleading coach, soccer coach, and played piano for every chorus concert.

Music was my super happy place. I played saxophone, flute, and piano. But singing...well, that was something

I had done from birth. I loved when Mom would be playing, I would be singing, and Dad would chime in with the harmonies. We lost Dad in 2019 and even as dementia was taking him away, music, barbershop in particular, was always the link that allowed us to hang on just a little. I miss him, his humor and his voice every day but I know that he is still mine and my Mom's biggest fan.

I have an Associates Degree in Music from Onondaga Community College and went on to Ithaca College as a voice major. Unfortunately, during spring break I became very sick and discovered that I had stripped my vocal chords and lost the hearing in my left ear. The doctor told me that singing was no longer in my future. To say that I was devastated is an understatement. I ended up getting a Legal Assistance Degree in Syracuse and when my parents moved up to Watertown, I soon followed. My hearing came back and occasionally I would hum to the radio but didn't sing like I used to.

In 1989 my Mom dragged me "kicking and screaming" to a **Northern Blend** rehearsal. Barbershop wasn't cool, I thought. I knew about it because my godparents, Jan and Nan Muddle, did it and I had won a Sweet Adelines Scholarship in college but it was NOT something I wanted to do. Right?

Wrong.

To my surprise, that first night visiting NBC after two years not singing, I did, and I loved it. I never looked back.

I am now a proud 36-year member of this amazing organization and it has given me more than I can adequately put into words. It has given me education, laughter, and more sisters than anyone could ask for. I have been NBC President a few times as well as Lead section leader. I am currently the Bass section leader and Visual Team leader.

I sang in a few quartets with my Mom and in 1998, Donna McKay and Anne Leinen asked if I wanted to sing in a quartet with them. Ummm, yes please! In 2001 **Upstate Rhythm** was honored to become Harmony Queens. I am always and forever grateful for everything I learned while singing with these incredible people. It is the foundation of everything I do today. We retired in 2003 when I moved to Chicago for a short time.

I sang in a couple of other quartets but in 2012, Katie Taylor, Lorie Autote, and Mary Ann Wert asked if I would sing with them in **For Heaven's Sake** as their lead, Laurie O'Donnell had gotten married and was moving. With Laurie's blessing, I said, "Yes!" I had actually been their chauffer many times after they won and knew all of their music so the transition

was seamless. We still sing together and since Lead is my very happy place, I love it! They are my family.

Katie, Lorie and I really missed competing and decided to put a new quartet together but the deal was, we had to sing different parts. I had planned to sing bass but when Jessi Nasto stepped into the picture, up to tenor I went. Now singing tenor is not always one of my favorite things to do (it's high!) but singing with these ladies is. In 2015 we were blessed and shocked to be named Harmony Queens. We don't get to sing together as often as we would like but we love it when we do.

"At Area 3 Morgan and Jess emceed, we mic tested, sang at the Glow, and








we mic tested with NBC!


August, plus the BHS convention in Denver in July! Next up are coaching and a show with Sing Niagara in September and a show with South Shore Saints (BHS) in November.



# **President's Award Linda Muise**

This award is given at the prerogative of the International President as a token of appreciation to an individual they feel has made a major contribution to Harmony, Inc.

Says International President Gaye LaCasce, "Linda Muise is one of those people who simply steps up to get the job done — whatever job that might be. She's comfortable in the spotlight, but a lot of the incredible work she does has been behind the scenes.

"She is a barbershopper, through and through. Her focus on member experience at contests is unparalleled. She's got a great sense of humor, but when she's serious, especially when it involves the quality and equity we expect from our conventions, there's no one more strong-minded and competent.

"I chose her for the President's Award for those reasons. She's flexible and principled; happy to operate in the background if it means getting a higher quality result; the epitome of "getting it done" - never do you worry when something is delegated to her. She steps up (and into) situations that may well be outside her comfort zone, but she's always ready to jump in!

And now for the rest of the HI-Story....

Linda has been a member for 43 years and is a charter member of **Sounds of the Seacoast**. She has served as Assistant Director, VP Music, and as Chorus Manager for all 43 years. Additionally, Linda has more than 28 years of service to Harmony, Inc. Her service includes six years as Area 2 Director, four years on the IBOD, six years as the International Parliamentarian, and 25 years on the Area 2 Council.

In 2005, she became a Certified Administrative Judge (Chairman of Judges) and served as a category specialist for twelve years. In 2019, she became one of seven pioneer women certified as judges for BHS.

A retired civilian administrator for the US Navy, she is currently doing part-time bookkeeping. Besides her service to Harmony, Inc., she is a volunteer at the polls and for several non-profit organizations. As a Justice of the Peace, she officiates weddings, including eight current or former members of Sounds of the Seacoast. When not actively engaged in her volunteer efforts, she dotes on her ten nieces and nephews, three of whom are music educators.

Linda's HI-Story demonstrates her dedication as a volunteer not only with Harmony, but several organizations. Asked what inspires her to volunteer she responds, "My parents were great examples of selflessness and giving back. It's been my modus operandi all my life. I'm lucky to have retired early, I have the ability to pick and choose what I want to do every day. For everything Harmony, Inc. has given me (and other members), and my desire to help keep it going, I gladly choose to give the bulk of my time to HI."

Asked what she loves about it, Linda responded, "Most importantly, the sisterhood, the life-long friendships, and the fact that every voice matters. I have been singing since I could talk (maybe before) and our organization is such a great platform for keeping that joy in my life."



# **Harmony Distinction Award Steve Tramack**

This award is given to honor special individuals who have contributed significantly to our organization and/or the barbershop community at large.

One of the premier coaches and arrangers in the barbershop universe, Steve Tramack cheerfully shares his talent with individuals, quartets, and choruses. As a result, barbershoppers around the world enjoy performances of the highest caliber.



Catching up with Steve is no easy task as he is often on the road spreading his love and appreciation for all things barbershop. We are grateful for this chance to share his unique HI-Story!

The son and grandson of barbershoppers, Steve's first experience was in October 1981 when his father's chorus, the Nashua Granite Statesmen, invited The Harrington Brothers to be a featured quartet. The year before Steve had flatly refused to attend the Granite Statemen's show as he "wasn't interested in my Dad's music." So, his dad cleverly offered to host the quartet.

"When my dad told me, 'The quartet has members your age. I need your help hosting them.' I couldn't turn him down," says Steve. "Not only was I wowed by the quartet, when the curtain opened on the chorus, I saw several members who were my high school classmates. I thought, 'well, maybe this could be my chorus, too.' I went to my first rehearsal the following Wednesday and never looked back."

Since that fateful night Steve has flourished within the barbershop community. "I love so many things about the barbershop style. First, barbershop isn't a genre of music; it's a style of arranging music which can be applied to multiple genres. I love Broadway songs, Big Band and Jazz Standards, Rat Pack era performers, Billy Joel, The Eagles, The Beatles, and Kurt Elling. We get to sing the same songs from all of these performers and styles in the barbershop fashion.

Second, there's something about the close harmony, chord vocabulary and variety, chord progressions, and the strong voicing of barbershop coupled with just intonation that creates this sense of lock and ring where you feel like you're part of something bigger than just the individual components. It's about more than just singing or listening; there's a "feel" to barbershop that creates an endorphin rush.

Third, I'm not aware of any other style of music that you can literally do anytime, anywhere, as long as you have three other parts. I've sung with people from age five to 105 from all over the world — some of them my family and dearest friends, some of them I've only met once, and the only common language we speak is barbershop. It's amazing."

As Harmony, Inc. implements our strategic plan, Harmony. Stronger, Steve shares his thoughts on growing our organization, "For years, Harmony Inc. was 'the best kept secret in barbershop.' I say, 'Why is it a secret?' The Harmony, Inc. experience has so much to offer women of all ages. The vibe at a Harmony AC&C, particularly Saturday night after the contests are over, is the best convention experience in all of barbershop. I'd love to see the organization grow. I think the roots are strong enough that the DNA will persist, and the organization will benefit from increased membership and reach."
